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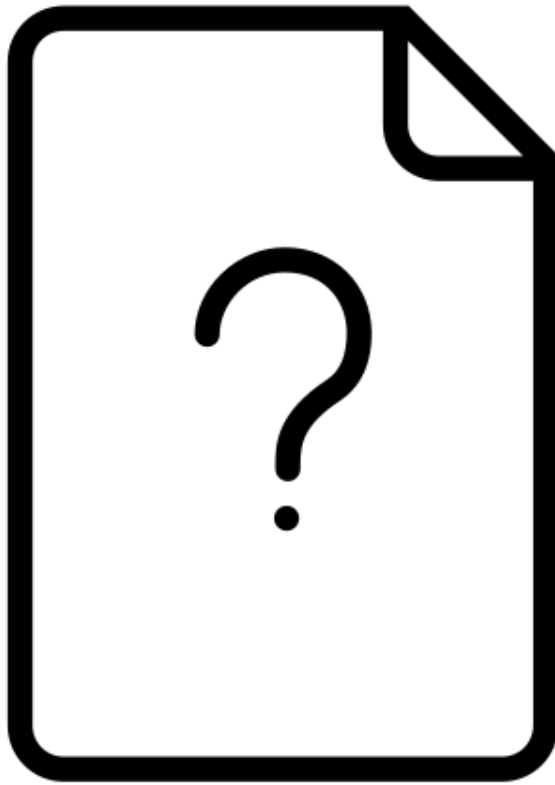
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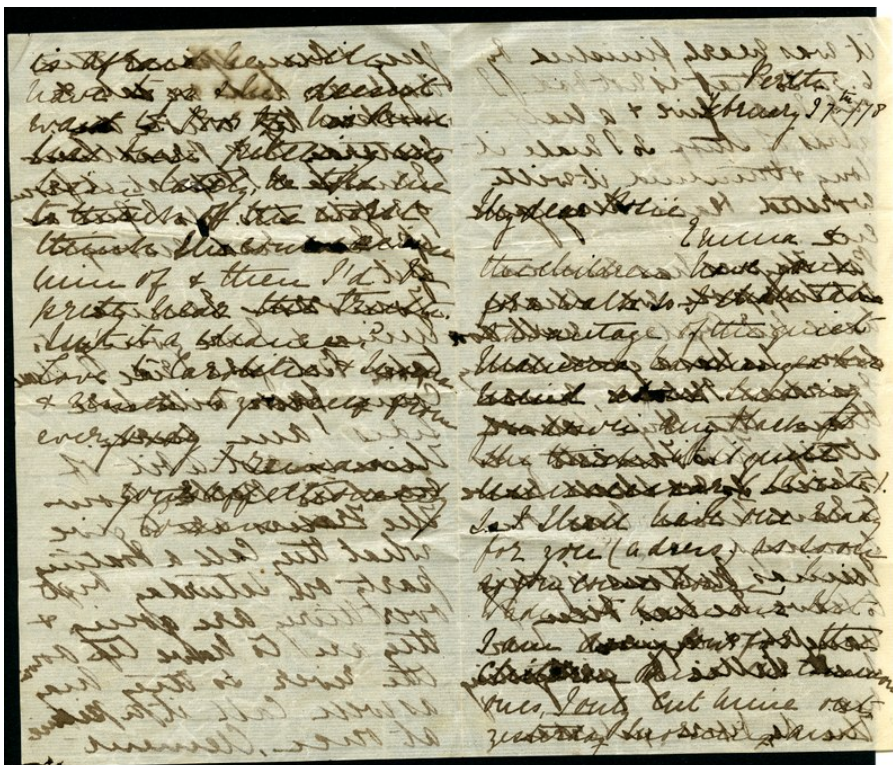
1: Item 220 – Australian and American nurses in New Guinea (1942)



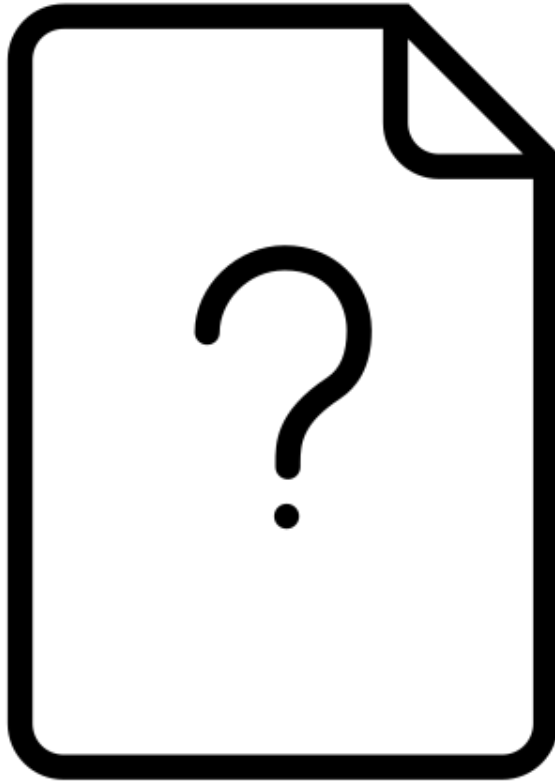
2: Item 1 – Seven Leake sisters in 1904 (1904)

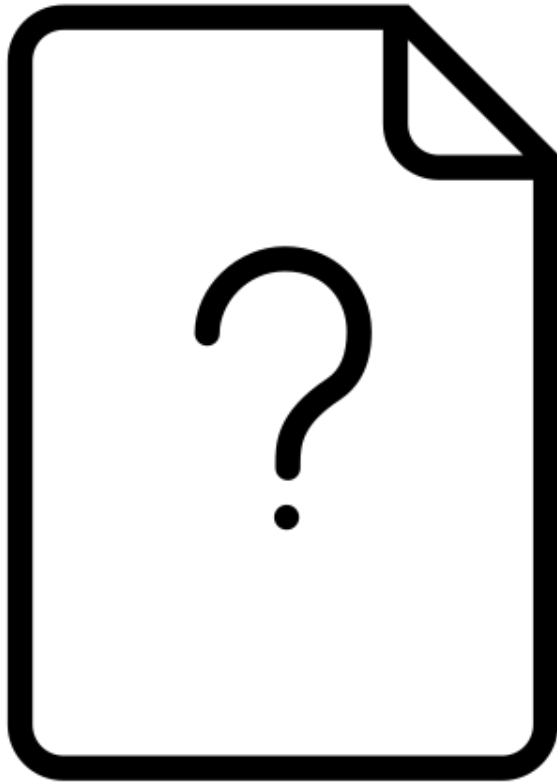
A very general

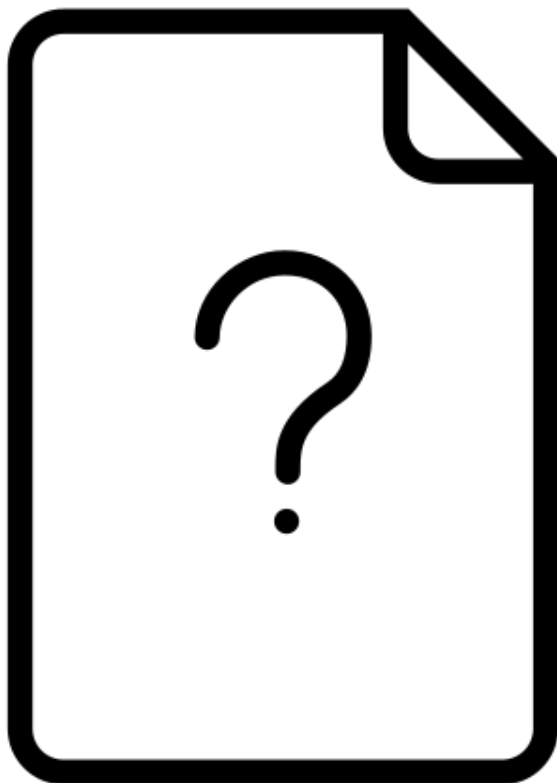

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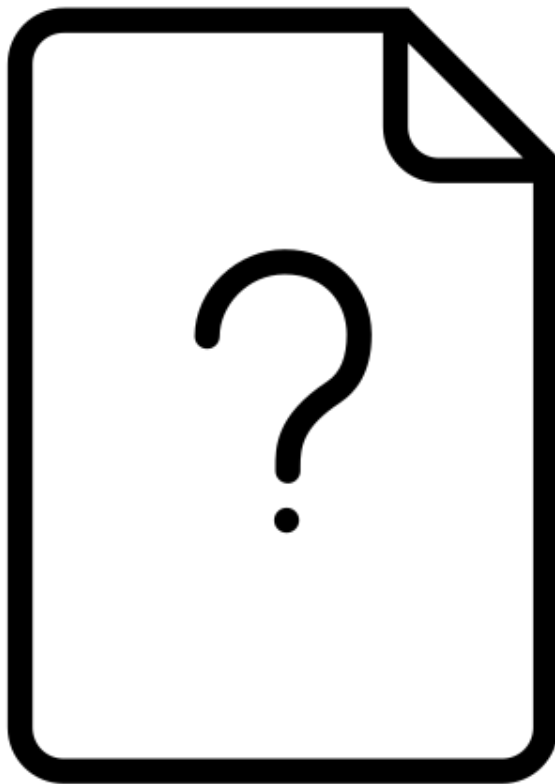
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
